## **ITALIAN BOOKBINDING WORKSHOP WITH BILL BARRICK**

Take a journey to Medieval Italy, when artisan monks handcrafted books that have survived to this day. In this daylong workshop, participants will create their own 6" x 9" hardbound sketchbook or journal using Oldworld bookbinding methods. Crafts to be learned include techniques for attaching paper signatures into a book block and crafting hard, durable covers from leather and wallpaper. During the workshop, Barrick has plenty of stories to share about his travels to Italy, where he learned the craft.

## **JAPANESE NETSUKE-MAKING WORKSHOP WITH CHIKAYO KAWAGISHI**

Netsuke are traditional Japanese ornaments made to be suspended from the sash of a traditional kimono. After a short introduction to Japanese netsuke, workshop participants will make their own ornaments with traditional Japanese dollmaker Chikayo Kawagishi. She studied dollmaking in Nara and has received various awards at dollmaking festivals, including the Verde Doll Festival, where her entry won the grand prize in 2009.

## **JAPANESE PRINTMAKING: HISTORY, TECHNIQUES AND MOTIFS WITH DR. ANDREAS MARKS**

Join Dr. Andreas Marks and the Wofford College Department of Art and Art History for this special lecture on the art of Japanese printmaking. This lecture, given by Marks, curator of Japanese and Korean art and director of the Clark Center at the Minneapolis Institute of Art, will provide an introduction and overview into Japanese woodblock prints (commonly called ukiyo-e) from the 17th to 19th centuries. Arguably the most recognizable of all Japanese art forms, ukiyo-e have spread over the world and have increased in popularity beyond the islands of Japan. Works such as Hokusai's "Great Wave," "Large Head Beauties" by Utamaro and "Striking Actors" by Sharaku were all produced with the same techniques as were hundreds of thousands of other designs.

Participants will learn about the production process as well as print collecting – both then and now.

## THE MANY LIVES OF GERTRUDE SANFORD LEGENDRE

Journalist and biographer Kathryn Smith will lead this entertaining, illustrated lecture on the fascinating South Carolina woman, Gertrude Sanford Legendre. Born in Aiken in 1902, “Gertie” led a life that spanned the entire 20th century – but it might be more accurate to say she lived many “lives.” Gertie was a New York debutante, equestrienne, big-game hunter, flapper, partygoer, naturalist, explorer, socialite, society bride, World War II spy, German POW, young widow, divorcée, philanthropist, artist, grande dame of Charleston society and a conservationist. Attendees will learn about Legendre’s fascinating life and her many brushes with fame as well as the permanent impact she had on coastal conservation. There is no recommended reading material, but attendees may want to view the Katharine Hepburn movie “Holiday” before or after the lecture as it was inspired by Legendre and her siblings.
