Proposal for Wofford College to look into updating the classroom facilities in Daniel Building:

Proposed by: Michael Langley

Whereas:

- 1) The Daniel Building serves as a learning facility on this campus.
- 2) The facilities of the Daniel Building namely the chairs and technological equipment are not on par with that of the other learning facilities on the campus.

Therefore be it resolved by the Campus Union Assembly that:

Wofford College and the appropriate administrative officials look into updating the Daniel Building facilities and take this issue into consideration when discussing future campus projects.

Proposal to Create a More Efficient and Effective Housing Lottery System

Proposed by: Nathan Madigan

Whereas:

- 1) The present Residence Life housing lottery system requires students (as a suite or pair) to list their top housing preferences in numerical order and are then assigned housing several weeks later.
- 2) New technology could be utilized to create a more user-friendly, autonomous decision making process for students and administration.
- 3) Students should have the right to be more specific in their room selection and choose housing based on present available options as opposed to hypothetical openings.
- 4) It is the goal of Residence Life to serve students in the way that is most beneficial to them.

Therefore be it resolved by the Campus Union Assembly that:

We recommend that Residence Life work with the Information Technology department and any other necessary resources to create a lottery system that will allow students to make their housing selections at the times determined by their lottery number. This should include the following characteristics:

- The student suite with housing lottery number 1 should have a designated time window (i.e. 10 minutes) in which to log on to the system and select their room, with lottery number 2 assuming the next time window, and so on throughout the lottery numbers.
- The system should include floor plans for all residence halls and buildings that allow students to first select their desired building, followed by their desired floor, and finally their desired room. This obviously requires that rooms that have been selected be indicated as such and updated with each new selection. This allows students to know at the time of the housing lottery where they will live in the following year.
- Students with special housing needs should be given housing preference in the manner that Wofford currently awards it.

- I. Dr. Don Fowler, the special assistant to the President of Wofford, spoke to the Assembly. He discussed the importance of Election Day, which is tomorrow. He told the Assembly about his involvement in politics. He pointed out that politics is the most comprehensive activity of any society especially of a democratic society like the United States. He noted that people cheat themselves if they do not participate in politics. However, he also pointed out that no one ever knows the outcome of an election until they are over. Dr. Fowler also noted that every vote counts and everyone's vote is just as important as someone else's vote. He also added that it is each person's responsibility to vote and it is important for all to be aware of what is going on in the political arena. Mr. Baylis asked about having a day off from school in order to go home and vote. Dr. Fowler pointed out that he would greatly like students to have the opportunity to go home and vote. However, he also added that most students do not actually go home and vote when given the day off. Mr. Jarzmik asked what Dr. Fowler's comments were on the Presidential election nominations. Dr. Fowler noted that he really has no idea, but he did comment. Mr. Crowe asked Dr. Fowler to comment on the division between the different parties. Dr. Fowler noted that the opposition is so bitter because the two parties have been very close in terms of the public's support in the recent past. He added that this relationship is unfortunate but there was a time when the parties got along and cooperated and he hopes to return to this type of relationship.
- II. President Fast called the meeting to order.
- III. Mr. Crowe gave the invocation.
- IV. Ms. Smith gave the historian's report discussing a portion of the terrier football history.
- V. And the minutes were approved as presented. Mr. McGill corrected the announcements section, pointing out that "march of dimes" should be changed to "March of Dimes." Vice President Albergotti also pointed out that the 6pm in her report, should be changed to 5:15pm.
- VI. The agenda was approved as presented.
- VII. Secretary Glasgow called roll.
- VIII. Officer Reports
 - a. Secretary Glasgow gave her report regarding
- IX. Committee Reports
 - a. Vice President Albergotti gave the Executive committee report. She commented that the proposals are great and she encouraged the Assembly to continue to present proposals. She also added that there are only about eight meetings left in this term.

- b. The Elections & Nominations committee report was given by Vice President Albergotti and she had nothing to report.
- c. Treasurer Langley gave the Financial Affairs Committee report. He noted that there is about \$1000 left in the general proposal, which goes through Interim. He also added that the interviews for spring allocations would be held on November 30. He mentioned that \$7500 could be allocated. He encouraged the delegates to encourage all organizations to apply for allocated funding.
- d. The Campus Relations committee report was given by Ms. Hall. She mentioned that the Publicity campaign would be this Friday. She added that the committee would like delegates to email comments about last year's event. The next meeting will be held on Thursday in the Commons at 11am.
- e. The Facility Affairs Committee report was given by Mr. Springs. He noted that the channel survey should be out soon. Also, the Facilities Forum is scheduled for November 30. He also added that there would be a lighting walk with hot chocolate for about an hour next week. The event is open to all of campus. Ms. Harris asked what the date was for the lighting walk. Mr. Springs answered saying that it will be next Wednesday, November 15.
- f. Ms. Gaylord gave the Wofford Activities Council report. She noted that the Fall Formal will be on Friday; the buses will run from 9-11pm and then from 12-1am. The next WAC meeting will be on Thursday at noon in McMillan.
- g. Mr. Madigan gave the Fun Funds report. He mentioned that the Halloween event and the ping-pong event both went well. He added that there is now a new ping-pong table for student use. He encouraged delegates to propose events.
- h. Secretary Glasgow gave the Planning Activities Committee report. She mentioned that there is supposedly a machine in the psychology department that can enlarge the calendar. She hoped that the calendar would be up by the end of the week.
- i. The Athletic Ad-Hoc Committee report was given by Ms. Johnson. She mentioned that Gold Rush t-shirts will probably be sold again and she noted that there would probably be a big basketball push as the season begins this week.

X. There was no Old Business to discuss.

XI. New Business

- a. Treasurer Langley moved to consider the proposal for Wofford College to look into updating the classroom facilities in Daniel Building. The motion was seconded; the proposal read and the floor was opened for debate. Treasurer Langley noted that after Old Main is finished Daniel would be the last building on campus to not be renovated. He added that the Administration should know that the Assembly desires the building to be improved especially for government major who spend a good bit of time in the building. The debate was ended. Treasurer Langley re-read the therefore clause and the proposal passed.
- b. Mr. Madigan moved to consider the Proposal to Create a More Efficient and Effective housing Lottery System. The motion was seconded; the proposal read and the floor was opened for debate. Mr. Madigan mentioned that every year the housing lottery changes and now with the new housing option it seems that lottery numbers are more important than ever. He added that this proposal could add a little motivation to the updating of the housing lottery. Mr. Wood noted that he believed this to be a very thoughtful and detailed proposal. However, he thought that the "therefore clause" bullet point two concerning groups being together may take away from Wofford students being randomly placed with student they usually do not spend a lot of time with; he does not want student housing to

have an environment that is closed off. Mr. Conner asked if there is a way to present a draft before the system is used. Mr. Madigan noted that that is a great idea. He suggested that Mr. Conner or someone else offer a friendly amendment or the Assembly can assume that Residence Life will present a draft first. Treasurer Langley added that the main reason for the proposal is simply the fact that it seems that when students are 21 and 22 years old, they should be able to choose who they live with. Also, he mentioned that students should not be discriminated against because they are not in living learning communities. He added that this proposal is just a set of basic guidelines and the Assembly can work with Brian Lemere to work out specifics. The debate was ended, the proposal re-read and the proposal passed as presented.

- XII. Mr. Hinton gave the Parliamentarian's Report and found the meeting to be in good order.
- XIII. Mr. Baylis mentioned that graduate schools would be on campus tomorrow at 11:30 in the Anna Todd. He also added that 1 in 4 rape awareness event would be held on Thursday. Mr. Crowe commented that the fundraiser for childhood cancer research raised over \$200; he thanked the Assembly for their support. President Fast noted that the housing lottery would still be by lottery number so no group should be able to be completely secluded. He also added that proposals are making a difference; he stated that the new senior class proposal is being considered now. Also, President Fast added that he hopes that Mr. DeKoster's voice feels better soon. Mr. Hinton asked if the new lottery system would still give priority to upperclassmen. Mr. Madigan answered saying that the numbers will still be dictated in the same way. President Fast added that nothing about the lottery numbers would change according to the proposal presented. He also asked the Assembly if they would purchase smoothies in Acorn Café. Mr. Crowe noted that a smoothie bar would mean a lot to him. Mr. Baylis mentioned that the only draw back might be the noise. Ms. Harris noted that the smoothies would be a healthy option that would be greatly appreciated. President Fast added that the Assembly should be sure to thank Mr. Walker for his continued help. He then added that Ms. Lane Evans is present to take the yearbook picture. Vice President Albergotti mentioned that the grandmother of David who works in Olin passed away yesterday. Ms. Gaylord added that Secretary Glasgow's 21st birthday is on Friday.

- I. President Fast called the meeting to order.
- II. Mr. Crowe gave the Invocation.
- III. Ms. Smith gave the Historian's remarks regarding Dr. Bair* who honored Benjamin Wofford with a bronze plaque. Beneficent. Warned students to be careful about sloppy work.
- IV. The minutes were approved by the Assembly.
- V. The agenda was approved as presented by the Assembly.
- VI. Vice President Albergotti called the roll.
- VII. Officer Reports
 - a. Vice President Albergotti had nothing to report.
- VIII. Committee Reports
 - a. In the Executive report, Vice President Albergotti welcomed Dr. Proctor from the Accounting Department. She reported that the Cabinet is working with several delegates to bring proposals to fruition. She also reported that Executive Committee will meet next week at 5:15 pm in the Olin Theater. Also, Vice President Albergotti sent around a sign-up sheet for CRC's publicity campaign. She asked that all delegates sign up to conduct surveys in Burwell so that Campus Union can continue to represent the students well. She added that Sam Hall will speak more about the Publicity Campaign during her CRC report.
 - b. Vice President Albergotti had nothing to report for the Elections and Nominations Committee.
 - c. Treasurer Langley presented the Financial Affairs report. He reported that Campus Union has \$1000 left in the budget, which runs through Interim. He updated the Assembly on some of the organizations that are using their allocated money: Ultimate Frisbee is going to Merriville to compete in a tournament and SCSL returned from a trip last week. Spring Allocation applications will go out soon.
 - d. Ms. Hall reported that the Campus Relations Committee is continuing its work on the Publicity campaign, which will begin Wednesday. Also, her committee is

working with Dean Coburn to plan this year's Winter Lighting. CRC will hold its weekly meeting on Thursday at 11 am.

e. Mr. Brown, in place of Mr. Springs, reported that a Lighting Walk will take place Wednesday at 7:45 pm. The purpose of this walk is to make sure that all areas of campus are properly lit. All delegates are invited, and Mr. Springs has sent out a daily announcement inviting the student body to attend. Hot Chocolate will be served in front of Milliken at 7:45. The channel survey will be sent to the student body tomorrow so that they can decide which channels they would like to add and block. Mr. Baylis asked Mr. Brown to ask Mr. Springs to contact Zach's about meat being undercooked, as he had heard several reports of that.

f. Ms. Ruthsatz, in her Wofford Activities Council report, thanked the assembly for coming to the WAC Formal last Friday. As it was a huge success, with an estimated 400 people in attendance, WAC plans to make the Fall Formal an annual event. College Idol has been canceled because there is a home basketball game the night for which it had been planned. On December 6, WAC will host its annual Christmas Party, which will be held in the Pavilion this year. Ms. Ruthsatz added that she had surveyed the committee at its last meeting about how to improve the weekly WAC meetings and boost morale. The weekly WAC meeting will be held on Thursday at 12 pm in McMillan.

g. Ms. Albergotti gave the Fun Funds report in Mr. Madigan's stead. She reported that Fun Funds is currently working on one proposal, but that the committee would love to see action out of Campus Union delegates and their friends.

h. Vice President Albergotti gave the Planning Activities Committee report for Secretary Glasgow and reported that Secretary Glasgow is continuing to work diligently to get the calendar up.

i. In the Athletic Ad-hoc Committee report, Ms. Johnson stated that there is a men's basketball game Tuesday evening and a women's basketball game on Wednesday night. Her committee will continue to sell "Gold Rush" t-shirts during the evening meal at Burwell Monday and at lunch in Burwell Tuesday.

- a. Mr. Baylis moved to consider the Proposal for Wofford College to look at Shaving Down the Speed Bump Outside of Burwell Dining Hall. It was seconded and read aloud. Mr. Baylis moved to open the floor for debate and the motion was seconded. Mr. Baylis addressed the Assembly on why he thought the speed bump should be shaved down. - I. President Fast called the meeting to order.
- II. Mr. Crowe gave the invocation.
- III. Ms. Smith gave the Historian's Remarks concerning the GP Bill of Rights, and how this affected the student body of Wofford College.
- IV. The minutes were approved as presented.
- V. The agenda was approved as presented.
- VI. Secretary Glasgow called roll.
- VII. Officer Reports
 - a. Secretary Glasgow gave the secretary's report explaining the information handed out to the Assembly.
- VIII. Committee Reports
 - a. Vice President Albergotti gave the Executive report and explained that there will not be an executive meeting next week because the Assembly meeting will be held at Dean Bigger's house at 6pm. She also reminded the Assembly to remember to bring their \$5 gifts for the Chinese exchange! She also explained that the Assembly could not vote last week because quorum was not present; so she encouraged the delegates to come to the meetings and remain present for the duration of all business.
 - b. Vice President Albergotti had nothing to report on behalf of the Elections & Nominations committee.
 - c. The Financial Affairs Committee report was given by Treasurer Langley. He explained that allocation interviews will be held on Thursday evening. He reminded the Assembly to encourage their friends to apply for funding. He added that in order to cover some of the funding demands, the committee is presenting a proposal to transfer some funds to the general proposal account.
 - d. The Campus Relations committee report was given by Ms. Hall. She reminded the Assembly that Winter Lighting will be tomorrow evening. She also asked that the Assembly check their t-shirts sizes as all of Campus Union will soon receive t-shirts designed by Ms. Barber.

e. Mr. Springs gave the Facility Affairs committee report. He thanked everyone who came out for the lighting walk. He added that hopefully there will be some lighting changes soon. He announced that the Facilities forum will be held on Thursday and the location is unknown at this time due to scheduling conflicts. Vice President Albergotti moved for unanimous consent to make the forum mandatory for all Assembly members. Mr. DeKoster announced that he has a prior engagement. Vice President Albergotti responded saying that he, and anyone else with an excuse, can email Secretary Glasgow. The motion was not denied and thus the forum will be mandatory for the assembly members.

f. Ms. Gaylord gave the Wofford Activities Council report announcing that the WAC Christmas party will be held on December 6 at the Pavilion.

g. The Fun Funds report was given by Mr. Madigan. He noted that three events are coming up including a study break hosted by the German club; an event involving letters to be sent to soldiers over seas; and another event during spring weekend. h. In the Planning Activities Committee report, Secretary Glasgow explained that the December calendar is coming soon. She added that she was going to have the interim calendar printed too, but she thinks events are missing, so she encouraged the Assembly to email events to be included.

i. The Athletic Ad-Hoc Committee report was given by Ms. Johnson. She noted that there will be a men's basketball game versus Western Carolina on Wednesday. She added that the women will host Winthrop on Friday. Dean Bigger added that the women lost to Wake Forest by only 2 pts and the men won against Cincinnati and were only defeated by James Madison by a small margin.

IX. No Old Business was discussed.

X. New Business

a. Proposal: Ms. McClain

Ms. McClain moved to consider the proposal for Wofford College to Extend the Weekend Hours of the Richardson Physical Activities Building - 2nd- proposal read; floor was opened; McClain noted that students have asked if this would be possible; debate was ended; the therefore clause was re-read and the proposal was passed. Treasurer Langley moved to consider the Proposal to Transfer Funds from the PAC ad-hoc fund to the General Proposal fund. The motion was seconded, read, and the floor was opened for debate. Treasurer Langley noted that there have been a lot of proposals and instead of letting money sit in the PAC account, we should use the money for students. Mr. Crowe offered a friendly amendment to change the proposal to read "charged with," and Treasurer Langley accepted. Ms. Harris asked what the PAC Ad-Hoc Committee was. Treasurer Langley explained that it is the Planning Activities Committee and the money was allocated to print calendars each month but that hasn't worked out as planned, so there is extra funding. The debate was ended, the therefore clause re-read and the proposal passed.

b. Ms. Johnson moved to consider the Proposal for Funding a Bus to the Clemson vs. Wofford Basketball Game. The motion was seconded, the proposal was read and the floor opened for debate. Ms. Johnson explained that students have said that they would rather go to the game as a unit instead of in single cars.

Treasurer Langley added that the Financial Affairs Committee approved and supported this proposal. However, he did offer a friendly amendment to change the proposal to read "\$10" and to omit part 5 and omit the last portion of the therefore clause so that the students don't have to pay \$15 instead they only pay \$10. Mr. Baylis asked where the tickets will be sold. Ms. Johnson answered saying that the tickets would be sold in athletics and there would be a waiver signed and \$10 collected from a maximum of 55 students who can participate. Mr. Springs asked if there was any way students that did not ride the bus can get a ticket at the discounted rate. Ms. Johnson thinks that should be possible. Mr. Crowe asked if a daily announcement could be sent out. Ms. Johnson confirmed. Mr. Baylis asked where is athletics? Ms. Johnson explained that the athletics office is in the Richardson building pass the racket ball courts. Debate was ended, and the therefore clause was re-read including the friendly amendment. The proposal passed.

- c. Ms. Harris moved to consider the Proposal for Funding Alpha Phi Omega Service Fraternity. The motion was seconded, the proposal read and the floor opened for debate. Ms. Harris explained that this service fraternity not involved in IFC, it is a gender neutral group, and added that the convention is as close as it will be in a few years. Treasurer Langley noted that the Financial Affairs Committee funded partially based on allocations in the past. Here is the break down: Hotel- \$50/night; Parking- \$27; Award- not funded; and he offered a friendly amendment for the therefore clause to read "\$757." The floor was opened for debate. Mr. Springs said that Dr. Whisnant says that this project is possible and is just a matter of time. He added that the proposal is to make it a priority. Treasurer Lanlgey asked what "Kiosk" means. Mr. Springs responding saying that he was not quite sure, but that is the language used by the computer department. Mr. Jarzmik added that kiosk means that there is limited access on the computers, and that they can print but viruses tend to be less common. Mr. McClain asked if there would still be room for the printer and the copier in the room. Mr. Springs said that yes there would be room, the copier would stay where it is and the printer would just be moved over some. The debate was ended; the proposal re-read and the proposal was passed.
- XI. Mr. Hinton gave the Parliamentarian's Report and found the meeting to be in good order.

XII. Comments and Announcements

Vice President Albergotti noted that Monica Wooten is looking for people who are interested in helping out in the community during exam week as a study break. The date that was given was December 13 from 8:30-4:30. President Fast added that the lighting walk will be held tomorrow night; he also pointed out that a group would be going to Wade's after the meeting. Ms. Hall moved to close; the motion was denied. Vice President Albergotti explained that anyone can bring money to any one of the cabinet members if they would like to donate more to the Angel Tree project. Secretary Glasgow reminded the Assembly to check in with her at the forum. Treasurer Langley asked if the Historian could look up the origin of the Chinese gift exchange and its proper name, so that that detail can be cleared up. He also reminded the Assembly to bring a present to Dean Bigger's house next week for the Christmas Party. Mr. Baylis noted that there will be an Art Exhibit at the Village on Friday from 3:30 to 5:30. Ms. Hall moved to close the meeting and the meeting was adjourned.
